# **INTRODUCTION:**

Thank you for choosing to invest in your child by becoming members of Cub Scout Pack 355. We are excited to have your family join us for lots of fun and adventure. In this package you're going to find useful information that it's going to help you go through the registration process.

You can start enjoying the pack activities while you work through your application. You have 30 days to complete your applications, get your training and background checks required, and pay for the appropriate fees.

Payment can be done by check made to "Cub Scouts Pack 355"

#### **INCLUDED YOU HAVE:**

- Youth Application and Adult Application Every youth, who is a Lion or Tiger, must have an Adult Partner included on their Youth Application. Any adult leader, or adult who has more than an occasional contact with youth, or 32 or more hours of contact with youth (not including family events, like Pack meetings) is required to be registered by BSA. Please let us know if you need or would like an Adult Application.
- Required training information Every Registered Adult, adult Lion Partner, and adult Tiger
  Partner must complete the Youth Protection Training (YPT) and CMG Connect training and
  background checks. This process will take you about a couple of hours each; however, the
  background checks could take up to two weeks in some instances, so please don't delay!
- Fees Information this is what your registration fee will cover and what it does not include.
- Calendar of Events Scouting is a year-round program. We understand you won't be able to attend every event, but at least you can plan ahead
- **Family Talent Survey** Parental involvement and Volunteering is what's going to make this pack successful. How can you Volunteer?
- **Contact information** you're not alone, we're all in this together! and there are plenty of resources to assist us as well

# **BASICS OF CUB SCOUTING**

Since its beginning, the Cub Scout program has been a fun and educational experience concerned with values. Besides providing a positive place where boys can enjoy safe, wholesome activities, Cub Scouting focuses on building character, improving physical fitness, teaching practical skills, and developing a spirit of community service.

#### PURPOSES OF CUB SCOUTING:

The Cub Scouting program has 10 purposes related to the overall mission of the Boy Scouts of America – to build character, learn citizenship, and develop personal fitness:

- 1. Character Development
- 2. Spiritual Growth
- 3. Good Citizenship
- 4. Sportsmanship and Fitness
- 5. Family Understanding
- 6. Respectful Relationships
- 7. Personal Achievement
- 8. Friendly Service
- 9. Fun and Adventure
- 10. Preparation for Boy Scouts

Every Cub Scouting activity should help fulfill one of these purposes. Not everything in Cub Scouting has to be serious – far from it! Silly songs, energetic games, and yummy snacks all have their place in the program.



#### THE METHODS OF CUB SCOUTING:

To accomplish its purposes and achieve the overall goals of building character, learning citizenship, and developing personal fitness, Cub Scouting uses seven methods:

#### 1. Living the Ideals

Cub Scouting's values are embedded in the Scout Oath, Scout Law, Cub Scout motto, and Cub Scout sign, handshake, and salute. These practices help establish and reinforce the program's values in boys and the leaders who guide them.

#### 2. Belonging to a Den

The den—a group of children who are about the same age—is the place where Cub Scouting starts. In the den, Cub Scouts develop new skills and interests, they practice sportsmanship and good citizenship, and they learn to do their best.

#### 3. Using Advancement

Recognition is important to youth. The advancement plan provides fun for the scouts, gives them a sense of personal achievement as they earn awards, and strengthens family understanding through advancement projects.

#### 4. Involving Family and Home

Whether a Cub Scout lives with two parents or one, a foster family, or other relatives, his family is an important part of Cub Scouting. Parents and adult family members provide leadership and support to youth in the program.

#### 5. Participating in Activities

Cub Scouts participate in a huge array of activities, including games, projects, skits, stunts, songs, outdoor activities, trips and service projects. Besides being fun, these activities offer opportunities for growth, achievement, and family involvement.

#### 6. Serving Home and Neighborhood

Cub Scouting focuses on the home and neighborhood. It helps boys strengthen connections to their local communities, which in turn support the boys' growth and development.

#### 7. Wearing the Uniform

Cub Scout uniforms serve a dual purpose, demonstrating membership in the group (everyone is dressed alike) and individual achievement (boys wear the badges they've earned). Wearing the uniform to meetings and activities also encourages a neat appearance, a sense of belonging, and good behavior.

### **ABOUT OUR PACK**

By now you have met your Den Leader, some of the other parents, and the Cubmaster, but a pack also has some other very important people involved. Crucial to the success of a pack is its Pack Committee and its Chartered Partner who provides a liaison to the pack known as the Chartered Organization Representative.

#### THE PACK COMMITTEE

The Pack Committee is made up of the committee chairman, the treasurer, the Chartered Organization Representative, and other adults from the community. (Most of these leaders are parents of the youth in the pack.)

The committee meets once a month or more often if needed and are led by a committee chairman. The committee recruit leadership, performs record keeping, manages pack finances, orders badges, maintains pack equipment, helps train volunteer leadership, and helps to recognize our volunteers.

#### THE CHARTERED ORGANIZATION

The Pack is operated by a Chartered Organization, ours is Atonement Lutheran Church. The Chartered Organization approves leadership, helps secure a meeting place, keeps the pack within the sponsor's and BSA's guidelines and policies.

They also select a chartered organization representative to be a liaison between our pack and our sponsor.

#### THE DEN

The Pack is divided into small groups called dens, who meet weekly under the direction of adults called den leaders. The den leaders are trained parent volunteers who plan the meetings and guide the dens in completing their achievements and advancements. The dens allow the children to engage with fellow scouts of the same age and to complete activities that would otherwise be difficult in a larger group.

Den meetings are planned and run by the Den Leader with the help of an Assistant Den Leader and parents. The meetings may include the following: games, songs, crafts, practicing skills, and ceremonies for the next Pack meeting. Most meeting activities involve working on advancement requirements. Lion and Tiger parents are required to attend every meeting and event with their Scout. Depending on the size of their Den and the planned activities, extra hands are often needed. While some advancements may be worked on at Den meetings, it is the parent's' responsibility to assist their sons in completing their advancement requirements.

# **VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES**

**CUBMASTER** — Everything that the Cubmaster does is aimed at helping the individual boy.

**CUB SCOUT DEN LEADER** — Cub Scout den leaders work directly with Cub Scouts and their parents/guardians to execute the Cub Scouting program in the den.

**PACK COMMITTEE CHAIR** — The pack committee chair leads the pack committee and thus is responsible for the administration, oversight, and support of the pack program.

**SECRETARY** —The secretary ensures proper records are kept within the pack.

**TREASURER** — The treasurer ensures the pack's finances are sound.

**ADVANCEMENT CHAIR** — The advancement chair helps boys move through the ranks of Cub Scouting and transition into a Boy Scout troop. Helps make sure advancements are recorded in Scoutbook and awarded.

**PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIR** — This position keeps pack activities visible to the public, as well as to the families of the pack.

**OUTDOOR ACTIVITY CHAIR** — This position helps the boys develop a love for the outdoors.

**MEMBERSHIP AND REREGISTRATION CHAIR** — This position is essential to the health of the pack.

**FRIENDS OF SCOUTING (FOS) CHAIR** — Some councils rely heavily on units to raise Friends of Scouting (FOS) funds.

**WEBMASTER** — This position helps keep the pack informed using our website and Scoutbook to communicate with everyone.

**POPCORN KERNEL** — This position organizes our annual fundraiser, selling popcorn.

**NEW MEMBER COORDINATOR** — This position organizes our recruiting with the Membership Chair, and is the welcoming face that helps new families get acquainted with Scouting.

**FALL FAMILY CAMPING COORDINATOR** — This position leads the planning for our fall camping trip.

**SPRING FAMILY CAMPING COORDINATOR** — This position leads the planning for our spring camping trip.

**PINEWOOD DERBY COMMITTEE CHAIR** — This person organizes our annual Pinewood Derby, including recruiting a committee!

This person organizes our annual Blue and Gold Banquet, including recruiting a committee!

### REQUIRED VOLUNTEER TRAINING

#### YOUTH PROTECTION

Child abuse is a serious problem in our society, and unfortunately, it can occur anywhere, even in Scouting. Youth safety is of paramount importance to Scouting. For that reason, the BSA continues to create barriers to abuse beyond what have previously existed in Scouting.

The Boy Scouts of America places the greatest importance on providing the most secure environment possible for its youth members. To maintain such an environment, the BSA has developed numerous procedural and leadership selection policies, and provides parents and leaders with numerous online and print resources for the Cub Scout, Boy Scout, and Venturing programs.

#### Youth Protection training is required for all BSA registered volunteers.

New leaders are required to take Youth Protection training before submitting an application for registration. The certificate of completion for this training must be submitted at the time the application is made and before volunteer service with youth begins.

#### We encourage all parents to take the BSA's Youth Protection training.



# **CODE OF CONDUCT**

#### BEHAVIOR AND DISCIPLINE

It is important that proper behavior and respect be demonstrated by every Scout at all times. Behavior is synonymous with the term "discipline." While this term often carries a negative connotation, the Scouting program strives to develop positive discipline in our youth. The term discipline has the idea of "training" or "a system of rules governing conduct." Rather than enumerate on every type of expected behavior, there are a few guiding principles that will help our Scouts.

- Scouts are expected to act like Scouts. The rest of the world has a concept of how Scouts should act and your child should have that concept as well.
- A Scout's conduct should not discredit themselves, the Den, the Pack, or the Boy Scouts of America.
- Fighting or bullying of any kind is not tolerated. There is a ZERO tolerance policy.
- Scouts are expected to demonstrate respect towards all leaders, adults, and guests.
- A Scout "Does Their Best" in all aspects of life, including behavior.

Please take a few moments to discuss these principles with your child and ensure he/she understands them. If a Scout's behavior becomes an issue for the leader in charge, the Committee Chairman will be notified and a Parent/Leader conference will be scheduled to discuss the situation and possible action.

#### PARENT RESPONSIBILITIES

Your child's success and learning within the Cub Scouting program is directly proportional to your involvement in their program. Please be willing to participate in activities & help Den Leaders.
